Overview of MAPS

Background and Context

- Top performing health systems are purposefully organized around, and prioritize investments in primary health care
 - These health systems deliver better outcomes and more cost-effective care
- Alberta is a leader in primary health care with a strong foundation, yet:
 - Challenges with equitable access and quality of health care, especially in rural and remote areas of the province, and for Indigenous Albertans
 - Need to strengthen how the system supports primary care providers, patients and caregivers
 - Need for better integration between primary care, other parts of the health system, and community-based social services
 - Issues exacerbated by pandemic; exhausted workforce



Overview of Modernizing Alberta's Primary Health Care System (MAPS):

MAPS will provide recommendations to the Minister of Health about ways to strengthen PHC and to achieve a PHC oriented health system that delivers the following outcomes:













MAPS Deliverables

- Existing elements of Alberta's PHC system that should be accelerated, spread and scaled, or improved
- Gaps that must be addressed to stabilize and improve PHC in Alberta, and solutions for doing so – especially for rural/remote and Indigenous populations
- Short-term opportunities to stabilize and improve PHC in Alberta
- Longer-term strategic directions and actions, and a 5-10 year roadmap (Final Report in March 2023)

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Ministerial Directions

- Build from existing strengths, but be bold if new directions are required
- Be aware of fiscal restraints and show value for investments
- Take a broader view of PHC and enable multidisciplinary care; not limited to primary medical care
- Consider both data/evidence and lived experience







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

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


FACT or FICTION?
